The very subject of democracy makes us visualize the definition we learnt in our school; as old as stone age and as repetitive as cycle of seasons on earth, Democracy is defined as a government of the people, by the people and for the people which further simplifies as people should rule themselves. Another school recap repetitive fact which is quoted frequently in order to make us feel proud about our nation; India is the largest democracy in the world. This sentence subtly throws curtains on the fact that we are the 2nd largest populous country on the planet therefore our size of economy and government will commensurate with this fact in large figures.

This incident is no less wanton then any dictatorship.

The Indian election lost its true spirit and became a game of selfish motives with unitary target of winning which gave birth to several political problems, a considerable one being religious extremism. In the name of democracy, secularism and equality the Indian National Congress openly supported malicious and invalid demands of minorities in order to gain political support.
